THREE CHEERS FOR THE GRADUATES

The City of Tallahassee's nationally recognized youth program, Tallahassee Engaged in Meaningful Productivity for Opportunity (TEMPO), graduated a record 187 participants this summer. They comprise the sixth cohort and the largest graduating class since the City began the program in 2017.

In a ceremony at the Old West Enrichment Center, 68 formerly at-risk students received GED certificates and 119 received technical certificates from Lively Technical College and Tallahassee Community College, in such areas as barbering, cosmetology, culinary arts, welding, commercial driving and Heating, Ventilation and Air-Conditioning (HVAC). Family, friends, City officials and community members cheered them on as they crossed the stage.

"I didn't have a high school diploma or a GED, so I had to start fresh," said Rashon Carter, a cohort VI graduate."I thank TEMPO and TCC for giving me the opportunity to do the right thing. I'm proud of myself. I'm happy. I did it. I changed my life."

The City of Tallahassee's TEMPO program is a public safety outreach initiative with a proven track record of successfully reconnecting disconnected or at-risk youth to educational and employment opportunities. Since the City created and launched the program, TEMPO has successfully engaged more than 2,700 area youth in educational and vocational pursuits while maintaining a zero percent recidivism rate.

The program's target demographic – youth ages 16-24 who are out of work and out of school – represent, according to data, Tallahassee's largest potential gun violence victims and offender pools. By offering guidance and a pathway toward a positive future, the City's TEMPO program has been described as a lifeline by past participants.

The City's TEMPO program also offers a stop-gap initiative that allows family members of participants to attain their GEDs regardless of age, further strengthening support networks and increasing a household's opportunity to move out of generational poverty. This year, two siblings followed in the footsteps of their parents who enrolled in the program and received GEDs in 2021. There are five sets of siblings who graduated together, and two graduates who received both their GED and technical certificates.

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STORE WATER DURING HURRICANE SEASON

Hurricane season is in full swing. The City of Tallahassee is prepared and urges residents to do the same. Personal preparedness can enhance safety and ease recovery. While rare for City water customers, a hurricane has the potential to temporarily impact service. Guarantee your family is ready should the worst occur by including ample drinking water in your preparedness supplies. Use these tips to help.

- Store enough water to last at least three days.
- Store water in high-quality plastic rather than glass containers, which can break, or paper cartons, which weaken over time.
- Fill clean containers from your tap, which saves money over bottled water.

STARMETRO FOR STUDENTS

It's time for a new school year. If your K-12 students don't have STAR cards already and are interested in riding public transportation to school, sign them up for StarMetro's Student Transportation for Academics and Responsibilities (STAR) program, which allows them to ride for free. STAR cards from the 2022-23 school year are valid until the student graduates. All students participating in the STAR program must have a STAR card and current signed agreement on file. With these items, students in grades 6-12 can ride StarMetro unaccompanied; students in

kindergarten through fifth grade must be accompanied by a sixth grade or older sibling, legal guardian or parental designee. Learn more at **Talgov.com/STARprogram**.
